Financial Situation: Struggling - saving

Description: No: we have money to operate safely, but do not have sufficient funds to do all that we would like. We are somewhat restricted in what we can and cannot budget for--there is no immediate plan for saving up for new boats, for example. Through membership fees and some sponsorship, we have sufficient funds to operate the club comfortably. However, when there is an accident or damage to boats it takes a large chunk of our funds, meaning we are unable to make long term savings for new equipment/boats. Additionally, members themselves frequently have to incur the costs of attending and competing in events particularly those outside of Scotland in the UK, EU or internationally which poses a problem in terms of accessibility.
